Horse Farm, where world famous Secretariat is laid to rest. Tickets are available for the entire event which include entrance to the galleries, including our new Old Pogue Bourbon Experience, miniatures

demonstrations, entertainment and some meals (\$150) or we have individual day pricing to visit the galleries and watch the demonstrators only (\$35). No food or entertainment are included with the day rates.

Marla's Musings

We all know Simon Kenton is considered the "father" of Mason County. We have all heard of his exploits in fighting the Indians that protected the Ohio River Valley and his search for the "canelands" of Kentucky.

If you are familiar with our county's history, you know he planted the first crop of corn in Mason County in 1775 and then retreated

from the area for nearly 10 years due to the American Revolutionary War.

When he returned to Limestone around 1784, he moved forward with a plan that had been formulating in his mind since his first visit to the area: he built his blockhouse at the mouth of Limestone Creek to provide shelter and safety to the settlers moving into the region.

This blockhouse provided a vantage point for Kenton and his scouts to keep an eye on Indian activity, which continued to plague the region until 1794, when the Treaty of Greenville ended the Twenty-Year war with the Indians.

During 1785, 20 families moved into "Kenton's Station," just west of Washington, and within five more years, Washington would have 119 log cabins.

From 1784 - 1794, Kenton claimed thousands of acres of land in Mason County, making him land rich. He shared his wealth with those wishing to make Limestone and Washington their permanent home. He wasn't an astute businessman and many times his generosity caused him to end up in debt, or without his share of the crops harvested. But that didn't keep him from helping those who had made the choice, just as he had, to stake a claim in this wilderness.

He gave his family members in Virginia tracts of land so they would relocate to the area and he would once again have family around him. He married his first and second wives in Mason County.

He sold plots of land to other settlers, not so much for the money but for the pride that came in having once held such large tracts of

land.

You see, for Simon Kenton, it was the thrill of the unknown and challenge of beating the odds that drove him to explore the world around him, rather than settle for a life as a common farmer or businessman. He had a deep interest in nature since his earliest years and the call of the frontier continued until he died at the age of 81 in Ohio in 1836.

What Simon Kenton did for Mason County was to serve as a guardian, mentor and host to the settlers arriving each day. Because of

his diligence, passage down the Ohio was safer and settlements in this region, especially Limestone began to thrive.

Although he wanted to see the area settled, in the end it became a direct conflict for his own desire to live a life away from populated areas.

In the book *Frontier Hero* by Shannon Gast, James Finely, son of the Reverend Robert Finley who ministered in Washington, wrote of Simon Kenton:

"That truly great adventurer was truly the master spirit of the time in that region of the country. He was looked upon by all as the great defender of the inhabitants, always on the alert, and ready to fly at a moment's warning to the place of danger for the protection of the scattered families in the wilderness...He was regarded as the prince of pioneers in this region of the country and he was the teacher and captain of all the young boys in those parts."

This 20" bronze of Simon Kenton with a long rife on a wood base was created by Earl Lanning in 1990 and inscribed on the base is "Sound in the Wilderness" with the name-

plate on the wood base that reads "Simon Kenton, The Frontiersman."

This gift was made possible by a long time member who saw this bronze and wanted it to be part of the Museum collection. It is our hope that this gift will enhance our understanding of the role of Simon Kenton's contributions to the early foundations of our community. As with this gift we continue to be indebted to many of you with your donations both in objects and finances to grow our collection.
